Media Summary:

Of the news organizations with advance copies, only the Guardian editor acknowledged that the paper has reviewed the material. The UK has also issued a Defence Advisory to the press and requested that news organizations brief the government if they plan to publish sensitive diplomatic files.

Anticipation of the release of the newest documents is being widely discussed and analysed. From a Canadian context, commentators referred to the damage caused during Naftagate as a possible reference point for damage control but also noted that previously-leaked information from Wikileaks generally had little consequence for Canada.

Generally, commentators agree it is valid to be concerned for the safety of foreigners and people at risk who are named in cables.

Speculation about what's in the documents ranges from allegations of corruption against foreign governments and reports on politicians in Russia and Afghanistan, to notes exposing behind-the-scenes Canada-U.S. diplomacy over Omar Khadr.

CBC reader survey: "Should WikiLeaks publish sensitive U.S. diplomatic files?", 85% in favour, 11% against out of 57,000 votes. Comments online range from calling the wikileaks a form of terrorism to others encouraging as much exposure as possible.

Twittersphere following closely with many urging a quick release of information before a war breaks out between North and South Korea and steals the headlines.

Next Steps

A message providing additional guidance, communication and additional tasking is being prepared for consideration by USS and DMA for onward transmission to Heads of Mission this weekend.

Date: November 18, 2004, appears attributable to former U.S. Ambassador Paul Cellucci to then-White House National Security Advisor Condoleeza Rice

Subject Matter: Iraq, information-sharing, BSE, Afghanistan, Haiti, Devils Lake, domestic politics, economy, trade, border, energy, environment

Brief Summary: This document was sent in preparation for President Bush's visit to Ottawa in late 2004. It is in large part a factual and/or positive (7-page) assessment of where the Canada-U.S. relationship was at the time. It touches on a wide-ranging set of issues including the political situation in Canada (Liberal minority under PM Martin at the time), Canada's foreign policy ("a certain amount of soul-searching here on Canada's decline from middle power status to that of an active observers of global affairs", and later in the report: "a modest but effective agenda on global affairs"), its engagement on "homeland security", trade, the border and energy and environment issues.

The report also refers to the need of Canadians to be "reassured" about the relationship with the United States. However, this comment is framed in the light of Canada's decision not to participate in the Iraq war, and is followed by

It comments that "the degree of comfort with which Canadian broadcast entities, including those financed by Canadian tax dollars, twist current events to feed long-standing negative images of the U.S. -- and the extent to which the Canadian public seems willing to indulge in the feast, is noteworthy as an indication of the kind of insidious negative popular stereotyping [the U.S. is] increasingly up against in Canada." official foreign policy is not set through these messages but here in Washington..."

* Multiple sources are reporting that the Wikileaks documents will come out in the press in the following order: Tuesday - Koreas and Guantanamo, Wednesday - Pakistan, Thursday - Canada, Friday - Afghanistan, Saturday - Yemen, Sunday - China.

International Developments / Implications:

Summary of reports to date from Canadian Missions:

Berlin

- * According to DIE WELT, the German government was informed a few days ago by American officials of the leak and had prepared a "Three-Point Plan" on how to react.
- * Steffen Seibert, Chancellor Merkel's Press Secretary, told the media that the German government will not comment on the content of the WikiLeaks documents. He simply stated that the German and US government were united in their regret over the publication of confidential documents. Sources from the Foreign Ministry said that they do not publicly comment on known confidential information.
- * There was no specific mention or relevance to Canada coming from Germany.

London

- * In the UK, the WikiLeaks stories first started emerging Sunday at about 6.30 p.m., when the Guardian and four other global news outlets began publishing online.
- * The FCO, through a media spokesperson, said: "We condemn any unauthorized release of this classified information, just as we condemn leaks of classified material in the UK. They can damage national security, are not in the national interest and, as the US has said, may put lives at risk. We have a very strong relationship with the US government. That will continue."
- * Former senior UK diplomats are reporting that while the leaks are very unfortunate, they will have little impact on diplomatic behaviour, nor will

they constrain diplomats' candour in their reporting. "But people will be looking at the security of electronic communications and archives."

* None of today's stories are about Canada, however in a broader piece entitled, "Let's Make a Deal" with foreign governments over Guantanamo prisoners, the Daily Mail notes that there, "had been fears that the documents would also detail the pressure put on Canada to repatriate Guantanamo detainee Omar Khadr...

Delhi

- Media coverage of Wikileaks "cable-gate" reflected the fact that the Indian Ministry of External Affairs and the Indian press have not fully processed the information in yesterday's first release.
- * Indian analysts are also following cables related to Pakistan, particularly when they impact India. The Times of India semi-gleefully reports "Pakistan, the world's nightmare," referencing cables that show US officials to be sceptical of Pakistani leadership.
- Yesterday, in anticipation of the launch, Minister of External Affairs Krishna is quoted as saying "The Indian Government is not really concerned. But we are certainly interested in finding out what this WikiLeaks are all about because they say that they are going to put on the web 4 million documents. So we will watch with interest."
 - No specific mention of Canada

Madrid

- * El Pais reported today on the 3,620 alleged cables from the US Embassy in Madrid to which they have had access (103 reportedly were secret, taken together the alleged cables were produced under three Ambassadors, from 2004 to this year).
- * Public and media reaction has been muted. The Spanish Government has said little and, barring shocking revelations over the next days, it is expected that Zapatero's administration will say little more.
- * At this point, there are no direct implications for Canadian interests from any of the reported alleged cables from the US Embassy in Madrid.

Ankara

* Today's papers give extensive front-page coverage to the scandal but so far there has been no official Turkish reaction to the leaks. Akşam daily newspaper notes that the leak was "the "9/11 of world diplomacy."

* Many of the leaks are critical of Turkish politicians with the assessments of Prime Minister Recep Tayyip Erdoğan and Foreign Minister Ahmet Davutoğlu expected to cause the biggest trouble in Turkish ties with the US.

* The documents show that the Americans don't view the government in Ankara as a real ally and have concerns about the reliability of Turkish politicians. The writer says that the secret cables were expected to rock Turkish politics. The cables will boost mistrust between Turkey and the US, the writer notes.

No specific mention of Canada

Reykjavik

* Initial reaction from Iceland has been very low key, in part because Wikileak servers have been so busy that Icelandic journalists have not been able to get access to the 290 documents relating to Iceland. Given preoccupations with the Sunday's election to the special assembly to draft a new Icelandic constitution, the issue has not been given much prominence locally.

* No mention of Canada

Wellington

- * In his regular Monday morning appearance on TVNZ's Breakfast show, NZ PM Key downplayed the gravity of the leaks for NZ by noting, "We don't know all of the details in them, but there's bound to be one or two comments in there that might lead to embarrassment at most, but nothing more serious than that". He added that the cables need to be put into context, and reiterated the US State Department's concern that the release of information will put lives at risk. He asserted that NZ's position is to "deal with whatever comes out".
- * The Pacific Island country of Kiribati (to which WLGTN is cross-accredited) was apparently offered incentives worth millions to take in Chinese Uighur detainees.
- * At this stage WLGTN is not aware of anything directly relevant to Canada's interests in this part of the world

Communications

Significant coverage in national print dailies highlighted Minister Cannon's condemnation of WikiLeaks' release of sensitive U.S. State Department cables. According to the dailies, Canada is mentioned in over 2,000 diplomatic cables leaked from the U.S. embassy and various consulates in Canada. Several articles report the documents indicate Afghan President Hamid Karzai's brother, Ahmed Wali Karzai, lobbied Canada "aggressively" to obtain a contract to provide private security for aid projects to rebuild the Dhala Dam in southern Afghanistan. The dailies note the documents show American and Canadian diplomats met with Karzai and felt wary of what U.S. diplomats viewed as his "malign" influence. According to the articles, documents further implicating Canada, including documents on Omar Khadr, would be potentially released this week. U.S. media was not at all focussed on the Canadian angle, as they have focussed on some of the colourful language used to describe some world leaders as well as focussing on the more problematic relationships in Afghanistan, Pakistan, Turkey, Arab states and Russia. The only Canadian coverage was references in some articles (including in the Washington Post) that Canada was one of the countries that Secretary Clinton had contacted and some references to Ambassador Jacobson's call to Minister Cannon with speculation that the conversation might have included discussion regarding Omar Khadr. There have been no references to Canadian political leadership or Canada-U.S. issues. Although the Canadian press has reported on the Canadian angle in two of the Afghan reports, there has been no reference here.

Communications

During the afternoon, the Canadian media continued to focus on statements by both Minister Cannon and U.S. Secretary of State Hillary Clinton regarding the effect of the leaked documents on U.S. relations with other countries.

In the early evening, several media sources discuss documents revealed by the New York Times pertaining to the case of Omar Khadr. The pieces focus on comments by former CSIS director Jim Judd, who reportedly described Canadians as having an "Alice in Wonderland" worldview. Judd commented on the videotaped interrogations by Canadian agents of Omar Khadr, saying it

could trigger "knee-jerk anti-Americanism" and "paroxysms of moral outrage." The former spy chief reportedly claimed the video would add pressure on Ottawa to seek Khadr's repatriation. The Globe and Mail also discussed other CSIS actions around the world, and cited Judd's reported comments about CSIS operations against Hezbollah supporters in Canada.

Twitter comments on the issue mainly posted links to articles discussing the leaked documents. Of note, several tweets linked to a GeoNewBlog post explaining several world governments

Carole: All right, breaking news on our top story this hour. "The New York times" has released new leaked documents from wikileaks. The documents refer to Canada and Canadian diplomats. Rosemary barton has the story. Rosemary?

Rosemary: Carole, this is a document pertaining to guantanamo detainees, and we were expecting that Canada might be mentioned in this exchange of diplomatic cables. It dates back to July of 2008, and it's a conversation, an exchange between a counsellor at the state department and the former head of c.S.I.S., Jim judd. As you can well imagine, most of the exchange deals with omar khadr. They talk about that infamous video, you'll remember now, that was released by the supreme court of Canada showing omar khadr being interrogated by c.S.I.S. Officers, and they're trying to gauge really Canada's reaction to that dvd. Judd tell us the state department official that he believes there will be heightened pressure on the Canadian government for the return of omar khadr once Canadians have seen the video. He talks about "an alice in wonderland" world view of Canadians and their courts that is tying c.S.I.S. In knots. He derides the Canadian courts for undermining foreign intelligence gathering at c.S.I.S. And he talks very positively about Stephen Harper and the conservative government's ability to "take it on the chin" when it comes to how the courts are trying to put pressure on Harper and the opposition parties are trying to put pressure on Harper to have omar khadr repatriated. He talks about how sections of that dvd that Canadians may well be familiar with now would trigger a knee-jerk anti-americanism and would result in paroxysms of moral outrage, a Canadian specialty. A very frank assessment from the former head of c.S.I.S. Who subsequently resigned in 2009 in reaction to omar khadr, this video being released, and how it should be interpreted by the US State department.

Carole: As we say, we're expecting a couple of thousand anyway documents pertaining to Canada and our relationship with the United States which mentioned a number of things. We're getting the headlines now. That's one of them. Rosemary, thank you very much.

Rosemary: You're welcome.

Carole: We are expecting the others sometime this week. That's the CBC's rosemary barton in Ottawa.

Summary of new reports from Canadian Missions:

BEJING

Despite coverage in foreign media regarding China-related content of WikiLeaks documents (particularly regarding China's views on North Korea), the only public statement from Chinese authorities has come from the Ministry of Foreign Affairs spokesperson Hong Lei in the regular press conference today who said, "China takes note of the government reports. We hope the U.S. side will handle the relevant issues. As for the content of the documents, we will not comment on that." Access in China to the WikiLeaks website has been blocked.

Communications

A significant number of dailies reported Minister Cannon downplayed the effects of the release of U.S. diplomatic cables by website WikiLeaks on Canada-U.S. relations. The articles noted that while condemning the release of documents by WikiLeaks, Minister Cannon touted the strength of the relationship between Canada and the U.S. Most articles focused on comments made in 2008 by Jim Judd, former head of the Canadian Security and Intelligence Service (CSIS), to U.S. counterpart Eliot Cohen, stating Canadians have an "Alice in Wonderland" approach toward terrorism. The dailies noted Judd criticised Canadian courts for making it difficult for CSIS to identify and prevent terror attacks and discussed the leadership of Afghan President Hamid Karzai and video footage of the interrogations of Omar Khadr. News coverage reported Judd expressed concerns regarding Iran and stated CSIS was "vigorously harassing" known Hezbollah members in Canada. Some articles note a large number of cables involving Canada are expected to discuss terrorism.

Canadian broadcast featured brief analyses on the content of the documents, notably comments made by then CSIS director Jim Judd discussing funding for Hezbollah, Omar Khadr, as well as the apology on the leak issued by U.S. Secretary of State Hillary Clinton. Several reports continued to note documents concerning Canada would be released sometime this week.

News websites did not cover any new angles during the morning hours, most merely providing minor updates to the CSIS angle of the leaked documents. Certain journalists published blog posts on the topic, one which is critical of Wikileaks for publishing the documents

* Since last SitRep, 6 new cables were uploaded to the WikiLeaks site, none of particular importance to Canadian interests.

* The media with advance access to the WikiLeaks documents have posted new cables on Afghanistan that have not yet been uploaded to the WikiLeaks site. The WikiLeaks task force and FTAG are reviewing the documents. The stories focus on US assessments of Afghani President Karzai and corruption in Afghanistan but make reference to Canada. In reference to Ahmed Wali (Karzai's brother) and his suspected connection to the opium trade, Der Spiegel writes, "Canada, which has troops stationed in Kandahar, would prefer simply to strip Karzai's brother of power, according to a dispatch concerning the visit of the Canadian ambassador to the US. Canada, the ambassador made clear, believes this is the only way to establish law and order in the region."

* Since last SitRep,55 new cables were uploaded to the WikiLeaks site, one rated as medium importance to Canadian interests.

* Further to the above, the WikiLeaks Task Force has sent a copy of this cable and a preliminary summary to Ministers' Offices, DFAIT Deputies, PCO and DND. The cable refers to a now dated US & Afghan assessment of the likelihood of Canadian troops remaining in Kandahar beyond 2007 and theoretically linking that assessment to Canadian troop casualties.

* The media with advance access to the WikiLeaks documents continue to feature cables on Afghanistan as well as on US assessments of

former UK Prime Minister Gordon Brown.

* WikiLeaks is reportedly having difficulty finding a domain to host its website, causing delays in the uploading of its documents.

* Question Period in the House of Commons saw three questions asked that related to the WikiLeaks issue (please see attachment).

Communications

Melissa Lantsman, Minister Cannon's Director of Communications, confirmed the RCMP is investigating http://www.infomedia.gc.ca/international/articles/unrestricted/2010/12/int201012718313257_25.htm who leaked a memo sent by Ambassador Crosbie to DFAIT headquarters.

Regarding his comments in WikiLeaks documents, Liberal http://www.infomedia.gc.ca/international/articles/unrestricted/2010/12/int2010121750685678_13.htm MPs publicly defended and reiterated their support for Ambassador Crosbie.

No new information concerning Canada was published on the WikiLeaks main site.

The WikiLeaks Task Force Operations Centre will produce another SitRep prior to closing.

SUBJECT: WIKI LEAKS TASK FORCE - Service Participation

BACKGROUND:

As part of the DFAIT Wikileaks Task Force, the Service and other government departments (OGD) were asked to supply liaison officers to facilitate the assessment and delivery of documents considered to have possible implications for Canada. (IAB) was identified as the Service Liaison office.

DISCUSSION:

Capturing and Assessing Documents

The task force has assumed that higher level managers at DFAIT will determine if a document is of interest to another government department, and disseminate it further. To date, no documents or assessments have been disseminated beyond DFAIT and PCO.

Service Liaison Officer

On 2010 12 02, reported to DFAIT as the Service Liaison Officer on the Task Force. Key departments including the Service, PCO, DND, CSEC, CIC and Public Safety formed the initial augmentation to the Task Force. However, other departments of possible interest, RCMP, CBSA, CIDA etc. have been placed on stand-by for on-call consultations. The Liaison Officers were briefed on the War Room functions and processes as well as the role of the Liaison Officers.

To date, DFAIT has been the sole assessors of all released documents. With the engagement now of Liaison Officers, DFAIT has advised that any documents released of potential interest to other government departments will be brought to the attention of the Liaison Officer, who will be responsible for assessing the document, preparing the assessment if desired and identifying a distribution list for the cable and assessment. Liaison Officer will be able to provide department specific insight, and contribute to a more accurate assessment of the implications. In addition, Liaison Officers will be able to get high impact information to senior managers immediately, rather than after processing through DFAIT.

In anticipation of the release of a large number of documents possibly related to Canada, on 2010 12 02, DFAIT requested department Liaison Officers to be present at DFAIT. It has now been agreed that depending on the volume of documenting being released, Liaison Officers will either be available on-call or work directly in the War Room.

Canada Day

Various media outlets have access to all cables possessed by Wikileaks and have released metadata of cable titles and coding, for all diplomatic cables. Based on an assessment of this data, DFAIT predicted that of the more than 250,000 cables, some 2600 could related to Canada.

Based on media reporting, it was anticipated that 2010 12 02 would be "Canada Day", during which most if not all of the Canada related documents would be released by Wikileaks. It is unclear why this large release did not occur as anticipated, however speculation suggests that the server problems on 2010 12 01, as well as infighting between Wikileaks leaders may have impacted the release.

An agreement has been made between these outlets and Wikileaks to the extent that the media has

agreed not to report on documents not yet released by the site. It is anticipated that this agreement will be upheld as long as Wikileaks continues to release documents on a regular basis.

Key Issues and Findings:

No documents of relevance to Canada are included in those

uploaded to the Wikileaks site since the last SitRep.

- * The site itself remains the target of unrelenting cyber attacks hindering its ability to post new material. It's ability to accept donations necessary to finance its activities has also been constrained as some online payment services have stopped Wikileaks from accessing their site.
- * Julian Assange, remains in a British jail awaiting a decision on whether or not he will be extradited to Sweden to face criminal charges. A Wikileaks spokesman was quoted today as saying that the document uploads will continue despite Assange's arrest.
- * Assange himself has indicated several times over the course of the last few days that many thousands of people have downloaded from the Wikileaks site an encrypted file containing some of the most explosive and politically damaging US documents. He is calling this his "Insurance file" and is threatening to send out the password to unlock the contents of the file should the authorities succeed in shutting down Wikileaks site. The cache of documents is rumoured to include materials on BP and Guantanamo.

Key Highlights of Cables Released over the Past 24 Hours by Various Media Outlets

The Guardian

Nato has drawn up a secret military plan to defend Poland and the Baltic States from Russia.

Intelligence co-operation has improved so much that the US now considers Algeria the key player in the fight against al-Qaida in the Maghreb region.

US embassy cables revealed America's ongoing battle to stem the flow of arms from eastern Europe to the Middle East.

New York Times

A week after Syria's president, Bashar al-Assad, assured a top US state department official that his country was not sending weapons to Hezbollah in Lebanon, the Obama Adminsitration lodged a confidential protest accusing Damascus of doing precisely that.

US diplomats expressed concern that huge cargo planes operated by Badr Airlines of Sudan were flying weapons from Tehran to Khartoum, from where they were shipped to Hamas in Gaza. The US asked countries in the region to deny overflight rights to the airlines. Jordan and several other countries agreed, but Yemen declined, a February 2009 cable reported.

El Pais (Spain)

Spain is worried by the prospect of Mauratania becoming a failed state, a "second Somalia".

The US Embassy in Nicaragua describes the country as a corrupt criminal state financed by drugs and "suitcases full of money sent by President Hugo Chávez of Venezuela. President Daniel Ortega is seen as unhinged and obsessed by his own security.

Colleagues,

The Wikileaks Task Force continues to monitor all documents uploaded to the Wikileaks site for content that is relevant to Canada. As of this morning basic key word searches have been completed on all the 1634 documents that Wikileaks has released. We remain at 9 as the number that are of interest from a Canadian perspective with all of those having been released in the early stages of this process. Short summaries/analyses have been done on these documents and forwarded to the responsible DFAIT divisions and OGDs.

Given that the pace at which Wikileaks has been releasing the documents to their site is far below what was originally anticipated we have re-sized the Task Force accordingly. We have moved from the A2-217 Task Force Ops Centre where we had 15 stand-alone work stations and dedicated IM/IT staff, to D1-600 with 3 work stations and staff on standby.

So as not to add to unnecessary e-mail traffic we have decided that Situation Reports will now only be issued on an as needed basis defined as when there is something directly relevant to Canada and Canadian interests to report.

Over the course of the holidays and into January the Task Force will continue to review Wikileaks documents as required. If specific subject matter assistance is required we will contact the appropriate DFAIT division(s) and or Points of Contact in OGD(s). For OGDs please ensure your POC is correct - see attached list. Any changes should be sent to the Wikileaks Task Force e-mail address.

For February and beyond our IM/IT officials are currently looking at longer term, more sustainable solutions should that be necessary. More on that in January.

Wikileaks - Guardian Report on US Criticism of Canadian Human Rights Policy on Cuba

1. The Guardian has released a US diplomatic cable dated 24Nov2009 written by the Head of the US Interest Section in Havana (Jonathan Jarrar) which criticizes, inter alia, Canadian, Australian and Swiss human rights policy towards Cuba. (See www.guardian.co.uk/us-embassy-cables-documents/236391). This document has not yet been uploaded to the Wikileaks site.

- 2. Suggesting that the three countries have adopted a 'friends at all costs' approach, the cable notes that during a visit by Minister Kent in Nov2009 he failed to meet with any civil society representatives or to issue any public statement critical of Cuba, Jarrar expresses some surprise at these developments given what he describes as Minister Kent's and PM Harper's public criticism of Cuban human rights policy which had led to the cancellation of a previously scheduled visit to Havana by Minister Kent the previous April. Jarrar's report does acknowledge that Minister Kent did raise human rights concerns with his Cuban interlocutors but that these interventions were met with the usual Cuban retort that they imprison only criminals and have no prisoners of conscience.
- 3. The report suggests that four different approaches (or `camps`) to the question of human rights in Cuba are evident. The first is the `Best Friends Forever` which is characterized by doing and saying nothing. According to Jarrar, into this camp fall the LATAMS, Russians, Africans, Chinese, Australians and many Europeans. The second is the `Keep It Private' approach which requires that nothing be said publicly. Jarrar suggests that Canada falls into this category. There is the `We Respectfully Disagree' approach where some countries chose to air their human rights concerns publicly when their officials visit Cuba. For Jarrar this characterizes the policy of the Vatican and the European Union. Finally, there is the 'Take-Your-Visit-and-Shove-It'(sic) approach in which countries refuse to let the Cuban government dictate to them who their officials may meet during visits. According to Jarrar, in this camp stands the UK, Sweden, Germany, the Czech Republic and Poland.
- 4. The report concludes with the observation that most of the 100 countries that have missions in Havana don't face a human rights policy dilemma with Cuba because for them it is a non-issue. Others (including Canada) employ different approaches but most simply 'do not press the issue.' Jarrar ends with the ironic observation that with respect to 'substance or economic benefits' those that 'acquiesce' on human rights 'fare little better' than those who chose to stand up to the Cuban government.
- 5. In response to media inquiries about the Guardian story Minister Cannon's office has refused comment.

Key Issues and Findings:

In a cable written by the senior official at the US Interests Section in Havana dated Nov2009 and released by The Guardian and New York Times on Friday, Canada is criticised (among others) for not publicly rebuking the Cuban government's human rights record. Minister Cannon's spokesperson refused to comment on the substance of the report when contacted by the media.

This morning Wikileaks uploaded a report which contained extensive references to Canada. The cable, dated May2009, reports on a series of meetings held by US Asst. Secty of State Gottemoeller on the margins of the Nuclear Non-Proliferation Review Conference last year. Included in the document is a report on a conversation with Canadian Conference on Disarmament Ambassador Marius Grinius. A preliminary analysis was done by DFAIT/IDA which deemed the report of 'Medium' interest. Today's Guardian carries a story on the document which also contains a suggestion by an Egyptian Ambassador that his country turned down offers of nuclear scientists, material and even weapons after the collapse of the Soviet Union.

Highlights of Other Recent Wikileaks Stories

* In Sept2000, former UN SecGen Kofi Annan offered Zimbabwean President Robert Mugabe a safe haven and a retirement package if he stepped down.

* US Vice-President Joe Biden referred to Wikileaks leader Julian Assange today as like a "high-tech terrorist".

* A Yemeni official told US diplomats in January of this year that Yemen's nuclear material's storage facility is very unsafe and could be easily attacked by Al Qaeda and the materials stolen.

US fears that Barcelona has become a key hub for terrorist activity in the Mediterranean.

The Aboriginal People's Television Network (APTN) has obtained advanced copies of approximately 800 Canada-related diplomatic cables that we expect to be shortly uploaded to the Wikileaks website. Two of the documents currently featured on the APTN website are the 2005 and 2009 US Embassy 'Security Environmental Profile' for Canada.

The cables provide a general assessment of potential security threats to the US originating in Canada and the Canadian government's ability to address these challenges. The Canadian Mission in Oslo has reported that a diplomatic cable was released today by a Norwegian newspaper which reports on a meeting between US Ambassador Jacobsen and former Environment Minister Jim Prentice on 05Nov09 (the document has not yet been uploaded to the Wikileaks website). Full report is reproduced below (note unclass security designation)

Highlights of the report include:

Prentice saying he was "shocked" by the negative public perception of the oilsands during a visit to Norway;

That if the provincial government didn't set more stringent regulations on the oilsands the federal government would "step in and press federal environmental regulation".

There is a need for an integrated North American carbon

market.

Environment Canada declined comment on a request by the Norwegian newspaper for an interview with Minister Baird. They news story contained a quote from a spokesman for the the Norwegian state oil company (Statoil) suggesting that "the public debate in Norway has been one-sided against the oilsands investment" but that Statoil has had excellent relations with Canadian authorities and they feel Statoil is a welcome investor in Canada.

Environment Canada will use responsive media lines developed for the release of yesterday's Advisory Panel on the Oilsands.

The Guardian released a report today written by the US Consulate in Vancouver on 12Feb09 commenting on preparations for the 2010 Winter Olympics. Overall the report suggested that the security strategy being put in place for the Games was "excellent" however it was coming at a cost to other RCMP operations in BC. As the report notes, "A DEA agent was told by one of his RCMP counterparts that by September all regional drug agents could be working on Olympics, with no investigations ongoing until March 2010. Already the RCMP has all but stopped marijuana-related investigations." The full report has been passed to Public Safety.

1) Summary: During an engaging introductory lunch on
November 5, 2009, Ambassador Jacobson and Canadian Minister of the
Environment Jim Prentice covered a wide variety of issues, ranging
from Canadás international reputation and potential damage from
oil sands coverage to exploring the possibility of a harmonized
continental carbon market and collaborating on the Great Lakes.
Minister Prentice clearly indicated his interest in working closely
with the Obama Administration and both parties stressed the
importance of the environment globally, but also as a key component
of our bilateral agenda. As an immediate follow-up, Minister
Prentice asked for assistance in setting up a conversation with
Senator Kerry to discuss some key issues of concern to Canada in

regard to potential Senate climate legislation. The Ambassador also agreed to assess interest in Washington on further exploring the benefits of a continental carbon market. Based on the breadth and scope of their discussion, the meeting established common interest and a mutual intention to push forward a strong environmental dialogue. End Summary.

- 2) From the onset of lunch, Minister Prentice was clearly making every effort to establish a connection with Ambassador Jacobson, outlining his respect for the Administration and his interest in President Obamás "back story", persona, and goals. The tone was very collegial and Prentice appeared unrushed, focused, and interested in getting to know the Ambassador on a personal level, sharing stories about his daughter, life in Alberta, and his love for the outdoors. Prentice appeared keen to forge a personal relationship with Ambassador Jacobson to the mutual benefit of both countries. Note: Prentice is widely-considered to be the most respected member of Prime Minister Harpers inner circle and enjoys Harpers complete trust. He is the lead Minister for climate change, as well as the lead on the Clean Energy Dialogue and Northern Gas pipelines.
- 3) During a discussion of the Ambassadors travels, Prentice

asked for his views on the oil sands. Prentice shared that he was concerned about the media focus on the sands and the possible impact on Canadás international reputation. He recalled that he was first concerned about oil sands coverage during a trip to Norway where the public was debating whether or not Norway should be investing public funds (Statoil) in dirty oil. As Prentice relayed it, the public sentiment in Norway shocked him and has heightened his awareness of the negative consequences to Canadás historically green standing on the world stage. Calling himself "conservationist-minded", Prentice said he would step in and regulate the sands if Canadás image in the world gets further tarnished by negative coverage. Although he never mentioned Natural Resources Minister Raitt by name (perhaps, an indication of the rumored tensions between the two Ministries), Prentice did say that he felt that Government of Canadás reaction to the dirty oil label was too slow" and failed to grasp the magnitude of the situation. As the Minister representing Alberta and one of the most senior Ministers in the Cabinet, Prentice made clear that he was constantly monitoring the situation. He noted that if industry did not take voluntary measures and if the provincial government did not set more stringent regulations, he would step in and press federal environmental legislation. In response to the Ambassadofs inquiry about a possible moratorium on further

expansion in the oil sands, Prentice didn't think it was necessary at this time and felt growth to the 3-4 m/b/d was sustainable. He agreed that the province should be looking at cumulative environmental impacts and addressing long-term sustainability concerns. At the end of the day, Prentice wants Canada to be billed as the most environmentally-conscious energy superpower.

4) As the topic turned to climate change, Minister Prentice highlighted a number of concerns that he was interested in discussing further, preferably with Senator Kerry prior to the passage of legislation in the Senate. These issues include: the need for an integrated carbon market, necessitated by the integrated nature of our economies and energy markets; a harmonized approach to a low-carbon fuel standard; further discussion of renewable portfolio standards; an assessment of the impact/nature of border adjustment measures; and a general increase in

understanding to avoid inadvertent/unintended consequences of U.S. legislation on Canada. The Ambassador offered to assist in setting up a conversation with Senator Kerry, as well as exploring the possibility of initiating a dialogue on a harmonized continental carbon market.

5) The last major topic of discussion was a mutual interest in the protection of and long-term health of the Great Lakes. Both parties expressed a desire to work collaboratively on such efforts.

Overall, the lunch was a success and laid a number of markers for further cooperation. Minister Prentice and Ambassador Jacobson will be meeting again for dinner on November 9, building further on their relationship. End Cable.
